## OPPORTUNITY GRANTS

It is with great enthusiasm that I announce the receipt of an Educational Opportunity grant, awarded to the Woodturners of St. Louis.

Each year the American Association of Woodturners awards grants to its members and clubs. Last September, they awarded \$27,500 in grants! We have been awarded \$1,000. We will use this grant to further our clubs woodturning knowledge, and to help develop our member's skills to assist in demonstrations and mentoring of fellow turners.

The educational grants offered to AAW clubs and members are one of the many benefits of membership. Individual members can receive a grant once every 5 years and clubs can receive one every other year.

Micki and Matt Keim also submitted grant proposals to attend Arrowmont, or a similar school, and were awarded \$700 each to assist in making that possible. They plan on attending the fall session and have not yet selected which course they will take.

We encourage all our members to join AAW, as the benefits you receive go far beyond the nominal membership fee.



We always have room for more helpers so contact Matt Keim if you need directions. Only 3 months left, and there's lots to do!




## TURNING A PLATTER

A PRESENTATION BY **BILL RUBENSTEIN**

Many times thin small pieces of wood can be used for platters. Often times turners overlook beautiful pieces of wood that are only ¾" thick, but platters can be turned from wood anywhere between ¾" and 2" thick.



Bill chose to turn a piece of bird's-eye hard maple, a difficult wood to turn due to its varying grain direction. When determining what side of the blank should be the bottom or the top find the side with the most figure. Once you identify the most appealing side, make that the bottom. When turning the top side you will turn through the less desirable wood and the better figure will show up in the bottom of your platter.



Once you have determined the top and bottom of your blank mark the center on the bottom and mount the blank between the live center, using the mark, and the chuck. The tailstock should be tightened to hold the blank firmly against the chuck. Friction will hold the blank while you start to turn the bottom of your plate.

Start by turning your blank round first, then create a tenon sized to match your chuck jaws. Your tenon does not need to be deep, 1/16" – 1/8" is enough, but should be square or dovetailed to match your jaw type. Bill uses a parting tool to create the tenon. Bill always compresses on a tenon rather than expanding into a recess. He feels that there is a greater risk of the piece coming off the lathe when expanding into a recess.



Now shape the outside bottom of the platter defining the rim. Once your happy with the shape stop the lathe and flip the platter so you can work on the top side. Bill has made a plastic "shoe" for his live center point. This allows him to use the tailstock to hold the platter flat against the chuck after reversing without damaging. He tightens the tailstock to hold the platter flat against the jaws. As he tightens the jaws, it centers itself on the tenon.



Start the top side by turning it true. Then begin to shape it from outside in, measuring as you go. Keep the tailstock in as long as you can, for additional support. When you can't go any further, pull the tailstock away for full access to the top of your



platter. Once the shape is defined you can switch to a heavy, wide, round nose scraper. It is very important to understand proper tool position when using a scraper. Scrapers cut on center but should always be tilted down. This almost always requires that you readjust the tool rest. If you switch from a gouge to a scraper and did not adjust the tool rest you probably have the rest too low for safe use with a scraper. Scrape the surface clean, removing as much tear out as possible. Bill sands through all the grits before moving any further.



Reverse chuck the platter using your preferred method (vacuum, cole jaws or friction). Bill uses a vacuum chuck, which allows full access to the bottom. Finish shaping the bottom and remove the tenon. Sand through all the grits and apply the finish of your choice.

Now it's time for dinner on your new platter. If not dinner, a display stand will make you just as proud of your beautiful creation.




