Hromek Demonstration Attended By 13

In June, Woodturners of St. Louis was fortunate to host the internationally acclaimed artist, Peter Hromek, for his first demonstration in the US. Thirteen club members spent about six hours in Dave Endres' shop learning from Peter. He explained how he turns on multiple axes to create his flowing, organic hollow forms.

The image to the left shows Peter preparing a blank for hollowing. Surprisingly, he uses a bowl gauge for deep hollowing. Below left, he is using a variable speed grinder with a cutting attachment to shape the void. Then, right below, he uses sand paper on the grinder to shape the opening of the vessel.

Peter discussed how he forms a piece without a foot but weighted so that the piece always balances with the opening on top. He explained his use of end grain to achieve an interesting pattern on the surface of his pieces.

We thank Peter for sharing his unique approach to standard turning concepts. And thanks to Dave for making space to accommodate observers in

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Keys to Turning Thin

Gary Hinegardner shared his understanding of turning very thin pieces at the last club meeting, the wood, the equipment and the process. Wood choice is very important, that is, consistent and free of defects. The edge is critical, as well. It must be smooth and free of chainsaw cuts.

When turning, start from the outside edge and work inward in steps, finishing each step and not coming back. Thickness must be left in the middle for support and only eliminated in the final steps. The edge needs to be slightly thicker than the rest and can be protected from splitting with a coat of super glue. To keep a good edge during the drying stage, especially for manipulated pieces, taping it helps to prevent cracking.

Hinegardner also demonstrated how to light the piece from behind (as seen to the left) in a dimly lit room to gauge the thickness of your work. Some woods are too dense to use this technique. Far left, he shows turning a thin bowl.

11th Annual Rocky Mountain Woodturning Symposium

Loveland, Colorado's Larimer County Fairgrounds at 5280 Arena Circle is the site for the annual 2-day event from September 12-13. Only 20 miles from Estes Park and the Rocky Mountain National Park, attendees will be near Old Town Fort Collins, Benson Sculpture Park and Chapungu Sculpture Garden at Centerra. Demonstrators include: Trent Bosch, Curt Theobald, Cindy Drozda, Allen Jensen, Joe Fleming, Craig Timmerman, Thomas Farrell, Pete Holtus, Marty Chritensen, John Giem and Ed Davidson. Mid-September is a great time to visit the Rockies.

This is a medium sized event with 140-180 attendees expected. Events include an Instant Gallery where you may display up to three of your best turnings. There will also be a hands-on learning center with scheduled projects every rotation where instructors will guide you from start to finish on a project to take home. Mini-lathes, tools and safety gear will be provided. There will be a large trade show area with vendors selling tools, wood, dry bowl blanks and lathes.

Individuals registering before September 1st will choose from 35 rotations over 2 days. The banquet dinner and auction are included for \$125 per individual or \$195 per couple. Teachers may attend for \$85 and students under 21 years of age are just \$25.
