Collaborative The AAW sponsors a competition for clubs to turn a collaborative. What is a collaborative? It is a project that is completed by as many club members as possible, with a minimum of six participants working as a team. All team members must belong to the AAW. There are size restrictions on the project but the work can be any turned object, functional or not. Pieces are judged in three categories: artistic, mechanical/technical, and fantasy. Rules are provided on the <u>AAW site</u>. Judging will take place at the AAW's 28 international symposium in Phoenix, AZ June 13-15, 2014. All levels of turning will be involved – novice to experienced. Contact Jon Spelbring or Bill Farny if you have questions or would like to be a part of this project.


