New DVDs this month -

"Turning Basics for Furniture Makers" by Steve Shanesy. This DVD gives basic instruction for adding turned elements to furniture. It was produced by the publisher and editorial director of Popular Woodworking magazine who states he learned woodturning to expand his shop skills.

"Segmented Turning, a Learning Experience" by Bill Kandler. He gives a detailed lesson in this type of project including a chapter on using a computer program "Segmented Project Planner".

Scholarships / Training The AAW offers scholarships/grants for training. For 2015 the AAW Education Opportunity <u>Grants</u> (EOG) had 93 applications and 19 were approved in the amount of \$22,644. Applications must be submitted by December 31 annually. Contact any of the officers if you would volunteer to write an application for our club.

In addition, the AAW Board of Directors announced a <u>scholarship</u> initiative. In recognition of the invaluable contributions made by our local chapters to our educational mission, scholarships to two of the nation's leading woodturning centers will be provided in 2015 to members of the American Association of Woodturners. Our chapter will be allotted one nomination.

If chosen by the AAW, the member submitted by our club for the scholarship must agree to host a demonstration for the club within 6 months of the training on the subject matter from Arrowmont or JC Campbell. If you are interested in being considered, contact President Bob Goulding (in writing/email) stating that you agree to the terms by Oct 31st.

The program is to provide tuition only. Any room and board and travel to the school locations will remain the responsibility of the nominee. John C. Campbell Folk School is located in Brasstown, NC; Arrowmont is in Gatlinburg, TN. *All classes will take place in 2016*.

Tech Tips>

- <u>AZ Carbide</u> is a supplier for carbide cutters. They sell all shapes and sizes that woodturners use. E.G. a 10.5mm square cutter is \$5.65 each and a \$2 flat rate shipping. Dan Burleson
- If the air flow for your Trend Air Pro face shield drops off and the filters are clean and the battery at full power, check the turbine on the motor shaft. Remove the motor/turbine assembly and tap it on a hard surface or your hand. If the turbine is loose it may just fall off into your hand. If so, apply a drop of superglue to the turbine and press it back on the shaft. Charles Sapp (thanks to Brian at the Bridgeton Rockler store for tracking down a tech support group in the USA to help me with this issue).
- To sand the inside of a hollow form with a small opening, cut a sanding block into about a 1" blank, insert it on a "L shaped" rod, and feed it into the opening. A little thumb pressure on the sanding block keeps it from rotating and it will sand as far in as inquiring turners are likely to reach. The sanding blocks are available at <u>Harbor Freight</u> in a variety of grits. Or you can glue your own grit on the foam with some spray adhesive.— Charles Sapp
