January 2016 Pre-Meeting ● Last year we followed the AAW basic training program for new turners. This year we will follow the same approach BUT we will offer hands-on lathe work. Gary Hinegardner, club member, has graciously offered to loan us 2 or 3 mini lathes for the program. We will still start the Premeeting at 11:30AM. Bill Farny will briefly discuss lathe safety and then demonstrate proper use of a roughing gouge. Members will then have hands-on time to practice. We can use a couple volunteers to help instruct and assist with the hands-on (call/email Charlie if you will help). If we have sufficient participation, the program will continue with hands-on turning with the spindle gouge, cutting beads and coves, skew,

Those that want to do the hands-on turning must bring a face shield and a roughing gouge. Material to turn will be provided.

I think it will not only be a terrific help for beginners, but I think even our experienced turners will benefit from a good review of the basics. I know I will. We will be looking to our experienced members to help present this material in future meetings, so please let Charlie know when you would be available to help with the training. It is very important that we all turn safely and that we encourage and train new members in the proper use of turning tools.

January President's Challenge — Burn It● No, it doesn't have to be an old log from your fireplace. The survey indicated that a lot of you want to work on embellishing your work. This is a challenge to start that journey. The burning can be with a wire, a hard surface (Formica or wood), a wood burner, or even a torch (just be careful in the shop). Entries will be judged by the members. A gift certificate will be awarded to the winning embellished turning. If we have more than 8 entries, all participants will be entered into a drawing for a gift certificate from Craft Supplies, USA. Entries must be turned within the last three months of the challenge and a limit of one entry (or grouping) per member.

Community Projects

Beads of Courage – Steve Reynolds

Children's Hospital in St. Louis has told us that they will be needing more BOC boxes around the end of February. This will be an on-going community program for our club. You can hold on to your boxes or bring them to the meeting and I will store them. Smaller boxes (~4" deep x 3" diameter) or larger boxes (~4" deep x 6" diameter) with loose fitting lids and a knob are needed. They will become keepsakes for kids undergoing cancer and heart treatments that use them to store their Beads of Courage. Wooden beads are also requested and will be used for special rewards. (See the May 2015 NL for tips on how to turn beads by Dave Ackmann.) The club has the BOC logo beads available (\$1.25 each) whenever you need more – contact Steve or Charlie for the beads. BOC bags are also being made for another hospital. The instructions on how to sew the draw-string bag are on the club web site. Thank you again. – Steve Reynolds

Using PVC for Beads of Courage Boxes ● Rick Madden > I learned about using PVC pipe for the boxes on WoodturnersUnlimited.com. There are three posts by Johnny Tolly about the PVC boxes; "Starting 2016 Beads of Courage Boxes", "Making PVC Beads of Courage Boxes", and "Wooden Jaws for Turning PVC Pipe". None talked about the ends, so I just "winged" it. Here's how I did the wood parts. This is a good way to make a BOC box



when you do not have wood large enough and eliminates the need to do a lot of hollowing. The top and bottom pieces can easily be made from $\frac{3}{4}$ " stock. You can purchase short lengths of the PVC at Lowes or Home Depot. I used the 6" diameter pipe cut to 4 " length.

For the base, I rough cut the piece on the bandsaw, drilled a 5/16" hole about a half inch deep for the worm screw that comes with Nova chucks. I used a shim on the worm screw so less than 1/2" of threads were showing. Mount that on the chuck and true up the edge and face. I then measured and marked with dividers the pipe size. I used a 1/8" parting tool to cut the groove for the pipe about 1/4" deep. Sand and finish that side (I used sanding wax and finished with beeswax and mineral oil mixture). Reverse the base using Cole jaws.

I had to get longer screws (like 1-1/4 or 1-1/2 long in 6mm size with some rigid tubing over the threads). True up that face and hollow out the center to a depth that will get rid of the drilled hole. Sand and finish.

For the top piece that will go on the pipe and house the lid, same procedure with worm screw and groove. Finish same as base. When reversing this piece in the Cole jaws, it's important to use a backing piece between the wood and Cole jaws slightly smaller than the wood. I used a piece of old paneling about 3/16" thick. This will prevent hitting the metal jaws when parting out the center portion for the lid. From there, you can cut a step inside for the lid, or not. It is your choice.

For the lid, rough cut on bandsaw, drill a 1/2" hole. Choose material for knob. I had scraps laying around that I used. If you want, you can turn a tenon to hold in the chuck, or, if the piece will fit in your jaws while square, that will work too. Turn a 1/2" tenon to fit the hole in the lid. Glue lid to this tenon and use the tailstock without a live center to hold things in place while the glue dries. Turn the lid inside and finish as much as possible around the edge and outside since the Cole jaws will get in the way. Reverse in Cole jaws and shape the outside and knob.

Other tips:

- Since the BOC bead is lettered on both sides and thick, you can cut the plastic bead in half. It can be held in the jaws on the chuck and cut with a Dremmel tool/wheel.
- The PVC can be painted (they make paint for plastic); covered with fabric (glue it on or sew the seam to form a cylinder); covered with decals (or just include a set of decals for the receiver so they can personalize it); or even decorated by turning.
- When using decals make sure they are compatible with your printer. Testor makes decal paper
 that works with an ink jet. They come with clear and white backgrounds. A clear decal may
 "disappear" depending on the color of the figure and the background. Office Depot/Max will print
 on decal paper (files can be uploaded on line or loaded on a flash drive).
- <u>Duct tape</u> is now used for decorating. Provide a roll for the receiver to use for personalizing the box.
- Please share your other ideas for decorating!

AAW Grant ● We have applied for a \$1500 educational grant that would be used for the purchase of mini lathes and accessories to be used for the hands-on training and public event demonstrations to promote woodturning. We expect to hear their decision around the end of the first quarter of 2016.

Survey • Thanks to everyone that participated in the club interest survey. We had 57 responses which is 63% of our membership. The results will be summarized and analyzed to plan events for the upcoming programs. A summary will be provided at our 2016 meetings and published in future newsletters. Congratulations to Mike Bockerstette and Michael Blankenship, the winners of the gift certificate drawing for participating.

More Woodturning Magazine ● This is a monthly online magazine for turners that is published 12 times each year for \$25. In return for providing this information and a link to their site, they provide an article and a list of turning events around the country for the club each month. The article can be accessed via the "members only" tab on the club web site. Let me know if you like this feature and if we should continue it. The article this month is on cubes in a sphere.

John Hoeing turned this box for BOC and will replace the beautiful spindle with a knob that kids can handle.


