

Welcome: May was another great month with the club's new lathes. These were again used to get more people hands-on experience with techniques many have not had a chance to use before. Jeff Hornung's pre-meeting offered this opportunity to use our valuable resource. Many people took advantage of the 3 lathes. Two with airbrushes and one with wipe on color. Sunbursts were being created by all. Including Cindy Pinneo's platter. She even added a leaf to the sunburst pattern.

Pre-Meeting Demo: Airbrushing – Jeff Hornung

Jeff brought in two sets of airbrushes and a full setup of supplies to demonstrate how to create a sunburst pattern on a small platter. He brought <u>Artisan Premium Coloring Dye</u> for the airbrushing, as well as a sophisticated and patented cardboard overspray cover. He began by quickly running through the airbrushing equipment and basic usage.





Jeff began by walking through the use of an airbrush to create the sunburst pattern. Starting with yellow, you will cover the entire surface of the platter. Next, orange should be used to cover between 1/3 to 1/2 of the surface area. In order to blend the yellow and orange, place denatured alcohol on a paper towel and wipe the area where the two colors come together. Next, use red

on the outer quarter of the platter. Using the same blending technique, wipe a paper towel between the red and orange. This now creates a sunburst effect with the three colors.





Meeting Demo: A Journey Through Jewelry – Dave Ackmann

Dave's journey through jewelry making on the lathe brought us through bracelets, pendants, beads, necklaces, rings and all of the tools and jigs needed to make every piece. It began with some basics of making jam chucks with a Beall Spindle Tap. This is a quick and inexpensive way to make a countless number of jam chucks, without having to swap faceplates.



Dave reminded the club about ensuring we follow all of the safety guidelines for our tools. He recently made a small mistake and ended up headed to the doctor. See his full <u>presentation</u> for the photo of his stylish fluorescent green bandage on page 5. Moral of the story, be aware of where your fingers are in relation to the sharp objects or spinning blades.







He then walked through each of the jewelry types. In describing each of the pieces, he went through how to determine sizes, where to get items specific to making that type of jewelry and materials he had experience using. Each time, he took a few minutes to walk through an example of the how's to make a particular piece. His full presentation has the full details on the demonstration with pictures and a narrative on the ins and outs of jewelry making.

President's Spin > Charlie Sapp ● The AAW recently quoted Benjamin Franklin ~ "Tell me and I forget. Teach me and I remember. Involve me and I learn". That quote reflects our mission of providing education and information to those interested in woodturning.

One of the best ways to learn is to participate in a workshop. You will have that opportunity when we bring in Tom Boley for a demonstration and workshop on October $1^{st} - 3^{rd}$. Tom is retired from a full-time architectural woodturning business and now pursues artistic woodturning and teaching. He is currently an instructor at JC Campbell Folk School and teaches classes in turning natural edge bowls and serving trays. Tom will host a demonstration on Oct 1^{st} (~9am – 3pm) and then two days of hands-on workshop/hands-on instruction. We plan on ~8 participants/day for the workshops on Oct 2^{nd} and 3^{rd} (~9am – 3pm). The event will be held at CJAP and costs will be available by the June meeting.

Most of all – have fun turning.

Thanks to Gary Hinegardner for organizing, providing the wood, and hosting the green wood event on May 29th. And thanks to the demonstrators – Dan Schmoker (chain saw safety and maintenance / and cutting up a lot of wood for us), Matt Keim (turning thin wall bowls), Paco Navarro (turning thin stem flowers), John

Buehrer (use of a hook tool), Cecil Robertson (Alaskan saw mill), and Dave Endres (bottle stoppers). It was an open air symposium with demonstrations on-going all afternoon and participants going from tent to tent. Logs of amazing size were cut into bowl blanks and the day ended with a tour of the distillery and a shared meal.

Thanks to Jeff Hornung for leading the May pre-meeting session with hands-on training using an airbrush and Dave Ackmann for showing us the what's and some how's in making jewelry. Club demonstrations are a great way to share your talents with our members. Tech Tips ● We are familiar with checking cracks that occur as wood starts to lose moisture. An even more dangerous flaw that we may not be familiar with is "wind shake". It is a crack or separation between growth rings in timber that is attributed to the straining of tree trunks in high winds. The rings can separate during turning creating a dangerous situation. Do not turn timber that has this flaw.




