Welcome: Now that summer is here to stay, we have more time to be outside turning and working on all of the projects we did not have time for in the winter. It is a time to learn new things about harvesting and turning green wood with the club, turning a lidded box or creating a flawless Celtic knot. Whatever you decide to do with the warm weather, keep making curly cue shavings and have some fun!



Pre-Meeting Demo: Lidded Box – John Hoeing

John's demo made creating a lidded box look quite easy. He started with a turning blank and brought it into round and placed a tenon on both ends. He then discussed the dimensions for the lid to base ratio (1/3-2/3, 2/5-3/5 or .688-.322). In order to create a tight grain matchup, John





recommends using a band saw to make the cut. He skipped this step and brought his own pre-cut box.





Starting with the lid in the chuck, bring the diameter down 1/8". Hollow out the lid and put a dome within the top. Make sure the lip is parallel on the inside and out using calipers. Finish the lid at this point. While still on the chuck, caliper the inside. Put the bottom on the chuck. Using the measurement, taper the lip down. Constantly check to make sure there is a tight fit. Once

a tight fit is obtained, trim tongue to the desired height. Then lightly clean up with sandpaper.

Now that the fit is good it is time to work on the shape of the outside of the box. Make the bottom to the point where you want it. Check the fit of the lid again and leave on. Now, very carefully, remove the tenon from the lid. Once the tenon is removed, do some final shaping and finish the outside.





John's technique to hollow the base is to use a large drill bit, followed by a forstner bit to do the bulk of the material removal. This saves on the tools and time it takes to hollow the bottom. Now it is time to finish. John used Richard Raffan's DVD as a guide for this demo. It is available within the club library.

Meeting Demo: Celtic Knot - Bob Goulding

Bob has on several occasions brought in turnings which have a Celtic knot within the piece. His method for creating the turning blank makes the process "Almost" Foolproof. The process uses some simple, methodical and straight forward techniques to getting the rings to cross exactly the correct place. He uses a table saw, a band saw and of course a lathe. Select two pieces of wood with a high contrast to each other.









Start with a block slightly thicker than the desired final diameter for the finished piece. Trim the piece to square, side to side and end to end. The "ring" inserts need to be the same thickness as your table saw blade. Make a gauge block for the inserts. This will be the made by running a scrap block through the table saw, but leaving a 1/4 "to hold the block together. Re-saw your insert wood to thickness, checking it with the gauge block. Bob describes, in detail, how to create these using a bandsaw to re-saw pieces until the thickness is correct.







Once the turning block is ready and ring inserts are cut, it is time to cut the ring slots. The table saw needs to be set to leave 1/8" of wood after the cut is made. Determine the angle you would like to make the cut. Between 10 and 30 degrees is what Bob has determined to work well. Setup the miter gauge at that angle and add a stop block, for a repeatable placement of the piece and clearly number each side of the piece. Make a cut and place a ring insert into the slot. Mark the outline and cut it slightly smaller than the piece. Spread wood glue and insert in the slot. Clamp the piece in all four directions. Once the glue is dry, cross out the number for the side just completed, turn the piece 90 degrees and follow the exact same directions for the next side.

Once complete with all four sides of the turning block, it can be turned like any other blank. Bob's full set of directions are posted on the club site. These include detailed pictures of the process described above.

Professional Woodturner Tom Boley Hosts Demonstration Day and Teaches Woodturning Workshop







The Woodturners of St. Louis are sponsoring a full day demonstration seminar and two days of hands-on private workshops with professional woodturner, Tom Boley. Everyone is welcome to attend.

Tom Boley has started up two woodturning clubs since 1995, including the <u>Flint Hills Woodturners</u> in Wamego, KS. He has owned a custom architectural woodturning business and recently retired to pursue his woodturning creativity. He is an inventive and gifted teacher and has taught at the John C. Campbell School and demonstrated at clubs all over the country. His demonstration will include several of his signature pieces.

Saturday, Oct 1, 2016 Demonstration starts at 9:00am

<u>Tom Boley</u> will first demonstrate basic bowl cuts then turn a square natural edge bowl. Next he will turn a natural edge bowl cut on the bias. This bias cut is an unusual orientation and quite striking. Finally, he will show how to turn architectural rosettes and time permitting discuss sharpening.

The demonstration registration fee is \$25; \$5 discount if paid before Aug 29th. Box lunch from Subway will be available for an additional fee.

Sunday, Oct 2nd and Monday Oct 3rd Hands-on Workshops

Tom will guide the class (max of 8/session) through making a square natural edge bowl or a natural edge bowl cut on the bias. Wood will be provided for the class. Workshop applicants must attend the demonstration and have a basic knowledge of the lathe and tool use. Lunch is on your own. It is suggested that applicants bring their lunch so you can meet with other turners and Tom during the break.

Everyone is welcome to attend. The registration fee is \$85; \$5 discount if paid before Aug 29th. The registration fee for the hands-on workshop <u>includes</u> the Saturday demonstration (package deal).

This is a wonderful opportunity to work with a master craftsman.
