

#### **October Meeting:**

The summer months have been busy for the club. We have made some big changes to how we display and hear speakers going on at our meetings. This included an upgraded sound system, 2 LED TV's and a new cabinet for the associated equipment. We have also made the setup easier with a new chair rack, which takes a fraction of the storage space to hold the same number of chairs. Lastly, we have new plaques to honor the donations of the Stubby lathe and safety shield. We also have a new web address for the club: www.stlturners.com



Several people completed turnings from the birch tree for the CJAP executive. We received a couple of more at this meeting and presented them to CJAP

leadership. These included a few bowls, a few natural edge bowls, a baby rattle and a lidded box.



The club again showed our willingness to give to others. The Beads of Courage effort throughout the year created 30+ bowls for Children's Hospital. We then took on Turning Pens for the Troops. The club turned over 30 pens to be turned over to the Woodcraft for distribution to our troops.

### Meeting Demo: Christmas Ornaments – Michael Blankenship

Michael came to show everyone the proper way to make hollow form ornaments. He has several tools and methods for turning ornaments. Two notable things he used to assist with his turning. First, he taped the tips of his fingers due to the amount of touch Michael uses to turn. Second, he has his tools in tool holsters on his belt. This ensures his tools are in the same place, all the time. This demonstration was how to create a three-part ornament with a top, hollow form middle and spire bottom.





Michael begins all of his ornaments by choosing some contrasting wood, which is done with great expertise by Jackie Blankenship. He then creates a blank using alternating contrasting wood in a pattern. He starts with rounding the whole piece, then rounding the end. He then uses a 1" forstner bit to drill a hole through the piece. Once complete with the hole, he rounds the end into a ball shape and parts it off.



The top and bottom icicle are made from the same piece of wood. He starts with rounding the piece. Using a circle cutter set to 1", he cuts a tenon into each end of the piece. Using the tenon, he mounts the piece to shape the icicle. He uses a small piece of Formica to 'burn' lines into the piece. Upon completion of the icicle he will part off with enough room to create the top. He sands the piece from 80 to 220 grit to and then burnishes using a brown scotch pad.

The top is made from the piece which was parted off, but has a tenon. Using the tenon for a guide to the size of the piece, he creates the top to be a low profile piece for attaching an ornament hanger. The piece is then ready for finishing via the same process as the icicle. Lastly, it is time to hollow and finish the center globe. Michael has a special tool for hollowing, pictured above, the center piece. Once complete, he sands from 80-220 grit and burnishes using a brown scotch pad.

Michael finishes by gluing up the pieces to get ready for finishing. He uses a mixture of 1-part Deft Lacquer plus 3-parts Lacquer thinner to seal the piece. He then uses several coats of spray polyurethane to complete the ornament.
