President's Spin ● This has been an exciting year for the club and we have accomplished a lot thanks to your enthusiasm and can do spirit. The year has been filled with great show and tell items, demonstrations, workshops and community service activities. Let me summarize some of our activities in 2016:

- Received approval of \$1500 educational grant from AAW for purchase of 3 Nova Comet lathes and accessories
- Used the 2015 member survey to provide demonstrations of interest
- Promoted our club at public venues (libraries, farmer's market, and woodworking show)
- Purchased and distributed over half a barrel of end grain sealer at a bargain price
- Received 501 (c)(3) not-for-profit educational organization status; secured sales tax exemption for club purchases; updated club by-laws
- Purchased and distributed polo shirts and club patches (patches available @ \$4)
- Distributed free sandpaper to club members
- Held off site green wood harvesting, safety, and turning demonstrations at Wood Hat Spirits
- Held 3-day symposium with Tom Boley
- Supported community programs: Turning Pens for the Troops, Beads of Courage boxes and bags for local hospital; and turnings from a white birch log for CJAP staff
- Purchased domain name: Stlturners.com and updated web site to perform on smart phones and tablets
- Sadly, we lost three of our long time members Bill Rubenstein, John Anderson, and Ray Koeneman
- Purchased cart for equipment storage, folding chair rack, and upgraded audio visual system with purchase of two flat screen monitors
- Received Stubby lathe from estate of Bill Rubenstein

Our mission is to provide education and information to those interested in woodturning and we will continue to pursue that in 2017.

• Several of you have already stepped forward to provide demonstrations for our meetings. Thanks your talent and sharing with others; it is most appreciated.

- We will be hosting a nationally known demonstrator in February 2017, Ashley Harwood. More <u>information on the workshop</u> and an <u>application</u> are attached to the newsletter and on our web site. It is a quick turnaround so be ready to respond.
- Skill enhancement days full day of turning with instruction by knowledgeable club members is in the works. Contact me if you would be willing to provide instruction for this event.
- Promote club and woodturning education at public venues
- Continue community service programs BOC, Pens for Troops, and bird houses for nursing home residents
- Grow our participation in AAW membership. Currently ~40% of our members also belong to the AAW. Membership and access to their past copies of the AAW Woodturning magazine; on-line video collection; and new search capability (Explore) make it one of the best educational values around. - Pursue AAW educational grant for AV equipment that will enhance our displays and open the opportunity to record and share meeting demonstrations.

Special thanks go to the CJAP staff for opening their facility to us for the Wine and Cheese social. Professional Woodturner Ashley Harwood Teaches Bowl Turning Workshop







The Woodturners of St. Louis are sponsoring two full day hands-on workshops with professional woodturner, Ashley Harwood. Everyone is welcome to register. Application form is available on the club web site: <u>www.stlturners.com</u>.

Ashley Harwood currently lives in Charleston, SC, where she sells her work and demonstrates woodturning weekly at the Charleston Farmer's Market. She teaches woodturning at her studio in Charleston and has demonstrated in a number of professional venues throughout the US and abroad, as far away as Australia. She received a BFA from Carnegie Mellon with a focus in sculpture and installation, and her design aesthetic is heavily influenced by her background in glassblowing. Ashley focuses on works that are completed entirely on the lathe, without carving, texturing, or burning. She uses simple, classic forms along with distinctive design elements that result in an approachable body of work with a high level of craftsmanship. Primarily, she makes utilitarian bowls, ornaments, and jewelry. Her teaching has a strong focus on tool control and sharpening. Saturday Feb 18th and Sunday Feb 19th, 2017 Hands-on Workshops

This class is primarily about technique. The aim is to build skills rather than create a masterpiece. The class will cover free-hand sharpening of turning tools using the platform on a bench grinder. Students will learn how to create the 40/40 grind on a bowl gouge. Throughout class, sharpening of other woodturning tools will be discussed as well. Students will practice the push-cut around the outside of a bowl, aiming for one pass all the way around the outside of a bowl with no torn grain and no strain on the body. The Seven Fundamentals of the Perfect Cut will be covered: lathe speed, stance, tool rest placement, chucking, sharpening, grain orientation, and technique. Later in the day, turning will focus on the inside of the bowl concentrating on even and thin wall thickness with no torn grain. Finally, jam chucks will be discussed for the reverse turning. Through improving technique, the quality of the cut can become nearly flawless, requiring minimal sanding, and the turning experience is more enjoyable. Advanced through beginner woodturners can benefit from honing their techniques to achieve a better cut! No experience required. Be prepared to make a lot of shavings!

Wood and Tool requirements:

Wood will be provided for the class. All students should have their own ½" or 5/8" bowl gouge and a spindle gouge. A Bedan, scraper (straight and curved), and bottom bowl gouge are recommended but will also be available on loan if you do not have them. Tools will also be available for sale.

This is a wonderful opportunity to learn from a master woodturner.
