Pre-Meeting Demo: Turning a Tea Light - Bill Farny

Bill went through the steps to turn a tea light. Mount a blank between centers and turn into a 2 to 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " cylinder. Cut a shoulder to fit the chuck. Remove the cylinder and mount into the chuck. Bring up the tail stock for support, hollow out the tailstock end. Using a parting tool, cut off of a 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ " piece from the tailstock end and set aside.



Next step is to face off the cylinder mounted in the chuck. Turn the desired shape of the tea light. Drill a 1.5" hold into the end of the cylinder about 5/8" deep. Clean-up the hole opening. Remove the cylinder from the chuck. Mount the piece that was set aside earlier into the chuck. Turn a jam chuck and mount the tea light cylinder on it. Next, turn the





shoulder off of the bottom. Finish the piece with a foot and your favorite finish.

Meeting Demo: Thompson Tools Sharpening – Doug Thompson

Doug uses and recommends the Wolverine Sharpening System and passed out his Sharpening Guide, which is designed to be used with the Wolverine System. His guide suggests a 60-degree profile on a bowl gouge and 40 degrees for spindle and detail gouges. He says to sharpen scrapers to 20 degrees and skews to 40 degrees. He demonstrated how to measure the angle with an inexpensive protractor.

Doug's sharpening guide directs the turner to set the leg of the Wolverine Vari-Grind Attachment to the angle shown on his guide and leave it there. The turning tool should be inserted in to the Vari-Grind Attachment with 1 ¾" of the



tool extended. Different profile angles can be achieved by sliding the V-Arm Attachment in and out of the base. One way to know if it is set properly is to coat the ground edge of your tool with ink from a felt tip pen. Position it against the grinding wheel and rotate the wheel, by hand, then look to see if the ink is scraped off evenly top to bottom. If not, adjust the V-Arm in or out to achieve the correct angle.



Doug discussed the various kinds of steel used in the manufacture of lathe cutting tools. The amount of Vanadium blended into the steel determines its hardness. Most lathe tools are M2 grade, with 2% Vanadium. M4 have 4%, 2030 have 5% and 2060 have 7%. Thompson tools use a powdered metal steel that has 10% vanadium and are then heat treated, quenched, tempered and cryogenically treated. That makes them very hard.

He also discussed the use of scrapers. Negative rake scrapers are very popular, these days. A normal scraper can be used with a negative rake by raising the tool rest and angling the scraper down. The top surface of a scraper can also be ground down to provide a permanent negative scraper profile.





Doug discussed grinding wheels. He recommends using Norton 3X "K" grade wheels. He recommends using 80 grit for sharpening and 46 grit for shaping. He thinks CBN grinding wheels are nice, but not worth the extra money (\$170 vs. \$40). Their big advantage is that they do not wear down and reduce in diameter.

Silent Auction ● No auction this month. If you have an item you would like to donate to the club, contact our President Charles Sapp. Donations are tax deductible.




February President's Challenge ● Birdhouse




