



March Demonstrator Keith Buxton – Creating and turning a bowl from a board has been around for quite some time. The advantage is that it requires relatively little wood to complete but does take time for preparation.

In its simplest form the bowl starts with a wide flat board about ³/₄ to 1 inch thick. The center is located and a series of concentric rings are drawn with a compass. The board is then cut in half (parallel to the grain) and the rings cut out on a bandsaw with the table tilted to 45

degrees. A ¼ inch bandsaw blade is recommended as it has to be able to make a continuous cut on the rings. The equal sized half rings are then glued together. After drying, the rings are face sanded with a drum sander, sanding disk on the lathe, or on a flat surface on a bench.

The rings are assembled and glued from the bottom up. Assembly and gluing can be one ring at a time or several at a time. A waste block, which will be screwed to a face plate, is glued to the bottom ring– alignment with the center of the base is critical.



After the assembly has cured for several hours it can be mounted on the lathe and turned to final thickness, sanded through the grits, and a finish applied.

The process can be done with a single species or there are several variations on the theme. Dark and lighter hardwood strips can be glued up to form the initial square blank. The strip widths are arbitrary, but symmetry may be preferred. Variation in size and ring angle can define variations in the bowl profile. Varying the angle from 42, to 44, to 46 degrees can give an outward flare to the profile (not a straight V but a curve). Dizzy bowls, with a swirling pattern, can be formed with thin rings and rotating each ring slightly.



The possibilities seem endless.

President's Spin • The Presidents challenge for APRIL is to turn a bowl from a board. If you do not have the equipment to do that, then just turn a bowl.

We will continue to meet at the Carpenters Joint Training Facility on Valcour. I read in an old newsletter that our first meeting in the CJTF was June 28th, 2015.

When building two piece tops always use birch or maple dowels as they are strong and don't generally shatter like some of the inferior woods (offered by some big box stores). You should check your dowels with calipers to make sure they will fit snugly in your top. Rockler offers a good quality dowel rod in many sizes. The use of glues and types of glues is also very important. Any of the Titebond glues I, II, III are suitable for use when making two pieces top. Glues that should be avoided are Polyurethane glues (Gorilla glue) and CA (Cyanoacrylate) glues, they are too brittle.

We had a good discussion concerning different glues, shelf life, storage temperature, etc. during the meeting. The Titebond web site is <u>www.Titebond.com</u>.

If you are a new turner (or even an experienced turner) looking for help or needing a question answered, contact me and we will get you to someone that can help. Members will be directed to the Mentor Coordinator and he/she will have the responsibility to direct the member to another member that can help. I will act as an interim Coordinator, but I would like to have another club member take that responsibility. Contact me if you would be willing to serve in that role. You can also check our website page that lists members that currently will provide mentoring to members.

Our demonstrator for April will be Michael Blankenship. He will demonstrate a copper lidded bowl. Michael is an excellent turner and I look forward to watching his demonstration. Michael is blind which makes his demonstration skills even more amazing.

We currently have four (4) open demonstration dates July through October. If you are interested in doing a demonstration for the club, please see me or John Hoeing. If you don't feel comfortable doing a demonstration in front of the full club but would like to get some experience doing a demonstration, we can arrange for some time at a pre-meeting between 11:30 to 1:00pm.
