



April Demonstrator Michael Blankenship – Turning a bowl with a copper lid. For this project Michael turns the lid first and fits the bowl to the lid. The copper is 22mil / 16 ounce from Basic Copper. He purchases a 6" x 10' piece and cuts to size as needed.

Shaping the lid is done using a wood form secured to the head stock. A small dimple is made in the center of the copper square and the tail stock is brought up



to secure it. A dimple works better than a hole as the cone tends to wallow out a hole. It will still puncture a hole but better controlled when starting with just a

dimple. A ball peen hammer is used to texture the copper. Starting at the outside and watching for any humps that might fold over. Michael works the texturing towards the center – while turning the piece round and round. When the desired texture is completed, the tail stock is moved back while holding the copper to the

form and the center is textured with the peen end of the hammer.



The tail stock is then moved back into place and snips are used to rough trim the square copper to a circle. After rough trimming, the flat face of the hammer is used to flatter the outside edge of the copper to the form. A scraper is then used to round the copper – pulling from the inside toward the form to keep the copper from bending. Sandpaper is then used to finalize the edge. Since a burr is

raised on the inside edge of the lid, sandpaper is used on that edge to remove the burr while spinning on the lathe.



The bowl is then mounted on headstock and the recess for the lid is formed. It should not be much deeper than the copper. The outer rim is then size for appearance and the remainder of the inside and outside of the bowl turned. A piece of tape on the top of the lid can be used to hold it for trial fits to the bowl (unless you have already finished the lid and installed a knob).

A propane torch is used to give a range of colors to the copper. Heat is applied in a sweeping motion to the back side. When colors appear and are what you want the lid is flipped over and checked for appearance. If you are satisfied with the colors – quit. If not, more heat can be applied to the front but more heat also darkens the surface. Experiment to see what can be done.

A button with a small dowel is then inserted through the hole in the center of the copper lid and a knob is glued to the dowel to complete the assembly.

President's Spin The Presidents challenge for MAY is to turn a copper lid for a bowl. If you do not have the equipment to do that, then turn a bowl with a wood lid. Or you can turn a bowl with a glass lid from a discarded crock pot or some other broken item where the glass lid can be

repurposed. The repurposing idea was suggested by Wayne Iehl. If you have questions about repurposing an item for this challenge, give me a call.

We will continue to meet at the Carpenters Training Facility on Valcour for our monthly meetings.

If you are a new turner (or even an experienced turner) looking for help or needing a question answered, contact me and we will get you to someone that can help. Members will be directed to the Mentor Coordinator, and he/she will have the responsibility to direct the member to another member that can help. I will act as an interim Coordinator, but I would like to have another club member take that responsibility. Contact me if you would be willing to serve in that role.

Our demonstrators for May will be Michael Blankenship & Steve McNeil who will demonstrate segmented bowl. We currently have three (3) open demonstration dates August through October. If you are interested in doing a demonstration for the club, please see me or John Hoeing. If you don't feel comfortable doing a demonstration in front of the full club but would like to get some experience doing a demonstration, we can arrange for some time at a pre-meeting between 11:30 to 1:00pm.

TO SELL OR NOT TO SELL.

The next time you make something fantastic a bowl, platter, lidded box, vase or hollow form and somebody say to you "You could sell that at the XYZ Craft Fair and make a lot of money" you might want to consider some thing before you jump in with both feet.

1.You will need to purchase tables, metal racks, a few chairs, tablecloths/ sheets to cover your table display items to help your items stand out. Plate racks to holder your platters and flowers live or dry to go inside your vase, hollow form or your Ikebana. Tables cost from \$30 to \$100 each. Metal racks cost from \$40 to \$80. Chairs range from \$10 to \$30.

2. If your venue is outside, you may need a tent, if you don't use a tent, you could be in the sun all day and a hat and sunscreen is advisable. A tent with four side sides is recommended to help protect your items as well as protect you should it start to rain. You will need four heavy weights or large building cinder blocks for each corner of the tent as well as straps to hold each of the weights in place. Metal racks are a nice way to display your items. The open grate of the racks allows for easy viewing but does not hold items steady in strong winds. Tents cost from \$100 to 300, Bricks and straps cost about \$40 to \$60.

3. Things to be aware of for outdoors venues. Rain can be a problem and you should be prepared to cover your finely turned collectables, least they fall victim to wet circumstances. A tent with sides can help but is no guarantee. Dew/water can form overnight and adhere to the top of the inside of your tent. When you arrive the next morning, your work is ahead of you. To get the water off the inside of the tent while still protecting you finely turned possessions. Blowing wind - If it's blowing more than 10 MPHs your items are going to be toppled to the ground like some 3-year-old kid having a temper tantrum. So, what do you with the bowl that now has a giant chip in it or a platter with a large ding? You may be able to epoxy in the chip or remount the platter and remove the ding. But this takes more time and money.

4. The cost of the venue/space at a craft fair can range anywhere from \$50 to \$150 per day. I did work a craft fair which offered me free space if I would demonstrate wood turning on a lathe. This was a benefit. HOWEVER, I had to bring a small lathe, stand, lathe tools, chucks, sandpaper, finishes, extension cord, wood to be turned, blanks, mask, eye protection, smock, Plexiglas shield to protect the public and a sense of humor. In addition, you will need display racks, sharpie, tape masking & packaging, 3X5 cards, pricing tags, PayPal reader or Square reader, bungee cords, string/cord and business cards and two vehicles one to carry the lathe and tools and one vehicle to carry the product (your fine turned wood turnings).

Other considerations are how well is the event known or well-advertised? The cost of food at the event. Coffee and donuts in the morning or an egg McMuffin at McDonalds. Lunch can cost \$10 to \$20. You can save if you pack a lunch the night before. The cost of fuel to drive to the venue. O'Fallon Mo to Kimmswick Mo (Apple Butter Festival) is ~50 miles one way for a total of 6 trips setup is on Friday night, festival is Saturday and Sunday. 300 miles/20 miles per gallon X \$4.00 per gallon = \$60 in fuel cost and this does not include wear and tear on your vehicle. If your customers pay using a credit card PayPal/Square charges you 3% of the cost of the transaction. The cost of storage containers to transport you valued/prized items from home to your selling venue range from \$25 to \$50. Remember you can buy some cheaper plastic totes, but they may not protect you items very well. You will need some small towels/cloth of some kind to wrap your item for travel. The cost of a hotel if you venture out of town can range from \$100 to \$150 dollars per night. If you sell you items on Etsy or eBay, both sites charge you a fee. I believe eBay fees are greater than 10% per item.

5. Finally, you took a class with a hot shot woodturner whose specialty is wood pens or wood bowls or wood platters. He tells you that he has had great success selling these items at his local flea market or Craft fair or even a gallery. You just finished his class, and you are feeling pretty good about the items you made in his class and can't wait to get home and make some to sell at your local flea market. Just because Mr. Hot Shot Woodturner can make and sell his items doesn't guarantee that you will be able to make and sell your items at your local venue. What price do you put on your items?

6. Simple math, The Craft Fair cost you \$100 + gas \$10 + food \$15 = total \$125. You sell \$500 worth of product. You spend 4 hours getting ready to go, 1 hour packing the vehicle, 10 hours at the show and 1 hour unpacking. Total spent is 16 hours = \$23.44 dollars per hour. BUT that doesn't include the time you spent making the items.

7. I do not want to sound negative I just want to open your eyes to other outside pressures that you may/will encounter when trying to sell your prized hand turned item.

Thanks to Rob Conway and Scott Eiswirth for managing the video presentation, I know it is a lot of work.

Thanks to our demonstrators Michael Blankenship and Jackie Blankenship for their detailed presentation showing how to make a copper lid for a bowl.

Bring your boxes (or bags) to the meeting and give them to John Hoeing. – John Hoeing

Secretary Report • April 24th - Pre-meeting: WTSTL wrote and delivered a check for \$250 for facility usage.

Tom Zeller (President), started by making several announcements:

- A thank you to members that made cash donations to our group that will help us continue to use the CJAP building for monthly meetings
- Seven gallons of end sealer were sold/distributed. Several members indicated that they would also like to purchase end sealer. Tom will pick up 5 more gallons from the Show Me Woodturners for distribution at the May meeting.

He used his thread chasing tool to create threads so that the top of the bank could be screwed off and on. He finished the bank by cutting a slot in a metallic bit coin and inserting it onto the top of the bank.

Wayne Iehl made his Bowl-from-a-board by "cutting" his board on the lathe, giving us another method of cutting out the circles for our bowl.

Mike Blankenship demonstrated making a copper lidded bowl. Mike makes the copper top before he makes the bowl. He used 22 mil (16 oz or 24 gauge), copper sheet, a specially created mold out of wood for the





shaping, and a small ball peen hammer for texturing. He made it look so easy that the President's Challenge for next month is a copper-lidded bowl (lid may be wood or metal).

Tips and Tricks Following the March demonstration on turning a bowl from a board, Wayne lehl and Rick Madden both made jigs to hold a parting tool on the lathe at an angle to part off the rings. This eliminates the need to made the rings in two parts and the need for a bandsaw. The pictures below show the jig made by Wayne lehl. It mounts in the tool rest and puts the parting tool (in this case a ground kitchen knife / Rick used a 1/16" parting tool) on the centerline. A template held against the board lets the uses set different angles so that a curve can be formed with the cut rings. When parted from the board the rings fall back and are captured by the fixture.
