



May Demonstrator Steve McNeil – Segmented Turning The first

step is to decide how many segments will be used for each ring. This determines the cut angle. (Steve pointed out that since Michael is blind his patterns have holes so that he can know the number to cut.) The size of the segments is determined by the shape of the item and the diameter of each ring. There are several sources to determine this information online (check the WTSTL library of <u>demonstrations</u> for detail sizing information.) Steve typically





uses a 24 inch long two inch wide strip for the pieces. The extra width provides material for design changes. Using the pattern piece and a jig, the pieces are cut on a table saw. Flipping the blank after each cut minimizes waste. A quick touch up of the edges and the segments are ready for glue up.




The glue up jig has a fixed and movable rest to accomodate various diameter rings. Segments are glued up into half rings. Rubber bands ( $3 \frac{1}{2}$ " x  $\frac{1}{2}$ ") are stretched over the segments to provide pressure. The segments are pressed firmly to the surface to keep them flat. Five or six jigs are used so that multiple rings can be constructed while the glue is drying. After



a few minutes they are set enough that the half rings can be removed and set aside

for final drying. The dried half rings are then touched up on a sander so the face is square and complete rings are glued up. A sander or disk with sandpaper can be used to flatten the faces and remove any glue that squeezed out.



A recess is turned in the top ring and attached to the headstock. Glue is applied to the faces and the next ring is attached using the tail stock to center and apply pressure.

A floating insert is used for the bottom to alleviate issues with cracking due to expansion or humidity. After gluing up the bottom ring segments and opening the center with a parting tool, a grove is cut with a router. A disk

is then turned to fit the recess and the ring glued together leaving the disk to float.







For deep vessels or those with small openings, multiple rings can be glued up and then turned. First, shaping the outside using a friction fit between sections and then shaping the inside of each section. A small ridge is left at each of the intersections to facilitate gluing and then removed to give a smooth intersection on the inside.

Multiple coats of wipe on Poly is typically used for finishing. Finish is also applied to the inside.

Our thanks to Steve McNeil for a great demonstration on segmented turning. A video of Steve's demonstration is available on the <u>WTSTL YouTube channel</u> and will be added to the club library.

**President's Spin●** The Presidents challenge for JUNE is to turn a wooden top. For the challenge we will have two categories, Cat A tops that can be spun by hand and Cat B tops that can be spun with a mechanical tool.

If you are a new turner (or even an experienced turner) looking for help or needing a question answered, contact me and we will get you to someone that can help. Members will be directed to a Mentor.

Our demonstrator for June will be myself and I will demonstrate turning a platter. We currently have three (3) open demonstration dates August through October. If you are interested in doing a demonstration for the club, please see me or John Hoeing.

#### CRAFT SHOW 101

I left something out last month about selling items you make. You need to know your market/customers. Are your customers willing to spend money or are your customers on a tight budget. Matthew Hill told a story in a class I took with him about going to a craft show in Oklahoma City. He had brought a lot of expensive items for sale. The vendor next to him had pottery items and cups called "Fart Mugs". That vendor sold them for \$20.00 and sold out. Matthew sold one lidded box for \$80.00 and that was the only item he sold all day. The morale of the story is that you need to know your market/customer base. Are you at a craft show or do you have your items in a high end gallery/consignment shop?

HEALTH AT THE LATHE: WORK COMFORTABLY AND SAFELY AT YOUR LATHE.

1. Wear eye and face protection and set a good example for others.

2. Wear a dust mask/respirator, dust from turning, or sanding is Bad Too the Bone and it is bad for your lungs. Set a good example wear respirator/dust mask. Install an air cleaner in your shop. Install a dust collection unit at your lathe. Open windows or doors to your shop to add fresh air.

3. Position your body at the lathe. The spindle/tail cone should be at elbow height, so you are not reaching up or not bending over. This helps prevent fatigue and back pain and helps with tool control. Use pads or a riser if your lathe is too tall. Stiff foam or I have some horse pads that I have used as they are very stiff. Make sure you have good lighting in your shop as well as at your lathe.

4. Footwear, wear closed toe shoes. NO OPEN TOED SANDALS. Use foam/gel/fatigue mats to help reduce fatigue. Keep you posture relaxed and upright with tools next to your body. Take stretch breaks, especially after hollowing an item because generally you have been bent over. Shift your weight from foot to foot as you control your tool movement. Pace yourself.

5. Shoulder, elbows and hands. Use the whole body to turn. Use a relaxed grip no white knuckles. Use overhand and underhand grip to keep from abusing your hands. Frequent changes of posture are good. It keeps from fatiguing one group of muscles. Try to reduce tool overhang on your tool rest. Use your hands together for control and to minimize impact to your joints. Don't use your hands as a hammer, use a mallet. Lubricate your lathe bed for easy banjo and tail stock movement.

The winner of this month's President's Challenge was Michael Blankenship himself for submitting a copper lidded, natural edged bowl. Wayne lehl also showed us several lidded bowls he created by converting CD disks, with and without the silver coating, as well as using a 45 record for a lid, and using a glass lid from a now extinct corning-ware type bowl (great options for re-purposing resources).

This month's demonstration was given by Steve McNeil and assisted by Michael Blankenship on their process for creating segmented vases, etc. Steve showed us how to make a table saw jig for cutting the angles consistently. He also explained his sanding, gluing, and finishing processes. As with everything that Michael Blankenship is involved in, the comment, "Easy enough for a Blind Man to do," did not go unnoticed.

President's Challenge for June – Turn a top. A contest will be held to select the top with the longest spin time. Multiple categories may be established depending on technique used to initialize the spin.
