#### July Demonstrator Jeff Hornung – Basket weave embellishment on a platter●

When doing a basket weave or any embellishment using paints, dyes, or other coloring keep in mind the species of wood and how it works with the media being used. Jeff uses maple for most of his pieces but sycamore, sweet gum, even poplar work well. Watch that the poplar does not have a green tint as that will not work well with the dyes. Jeff offered another definition of plate versus platter – you eat off a plate and you serve off a platter.



Jeff initially lays out his pattern on polar graph paper using color pencils. This lets him verify that the design fits and that the colors complement each other. For the actual coloring on the item he uses a variety of art pens, alcohol dye pen, water color markers,... His favorite is the Pitt pen by Faber Castell. He uses the small (S) and the brush (B). They are available at a variety of hobby shops and <u>ArtMart</u>.



For a platter Jeff would use a worm screw in the front face, shape the back into an ogee



curve, and cut a recess for the chuck jaws when reversing the piece. The front would then be turned – marking the rim diameter based on the size and number of beads. The surface was then refined using a negative rake scraper. (This demo was to show the basket weave technique so the piece was not turned as a platter but was actually demo'd on what would be the bottom of a future



platter. So look at the pictures with that in mind.)



Jeff uses a <u>D-Way beading tool</u>. They are available in a variety of sizes. The first bead is cut and then the inside groove is used to locate the tool for the next bead and so on. The beading tool is a scraper. The cut is started with the tool handle low, once the tool is engaged it is rocked side to side (wiggle wiggle) and the handle lifted until the total bead is cut. The flute of the beading tool is down. After all the beads are cut, the valleys are "burned" by friction. Jeff has found that



two playing cards are stiff enough and the proper width. As the cards are worn


away a new area is presented to the piece. Formica, a piece of hard wood, folded sandpaper,... can also be used.





The radial lines can be drawn/burned with a homemade or a commercial jig. Jeff showed his homemade version first – a fixture is mounted on the lathe ways with the top at the centerline of the drive. A board with a radial pattern taped to

it with the number of divisions desired is mounted on the headstock and secured by the



chuck. The drive is rotated until a line on the board aligns with the top of the mounted jig, the board is clamped, and a line drawn on the face (this must also be mounted so that the pencil or burner aligns with the center of the drive. Then the clamp is removed, the pattern rotated to the next line, clamped and repeated. A commercial version (Chefwarekits) does a similar function but they often have a spring loaded pin that drops into a

banjo to hold either a pencil marking device or a wood burner to do the lines without marking.







If is important that the woodburner has the capability to recover quickly (heat is dissipated when the tip touches the wood) and to provide the needed heat to burn (varies with species and tip design). Jeff uses the Razor Tip SL3. Other brands are Burn Master, Optima,... A fish scale tip is used in the burner. They come in various sizes to match the bead diameter. The tip is pressed into the bead – rock-rock side-to-side and it is complete. Move the indexer and repeat. Good ventilation and / or smoke collector is needed. (Editor's note- when using a fan

to remove the smoke, have the fan pull the smoke away versus blowing over your surface. You will have better heat control on your burner.)

Jeff uses a magnifier with lots of light when coloring the piece. Several grids are colored then the piece is flipped to color the areas previously missed. Mistakes in burning and coloring can be corrected by scraping with an Xacto blade (to some degree).



Jeff is a full time woodturner, teacher, and artist. He teaches private lessons and has demonstrated virtually and in person nationally and internationally. He instructs at Craft Alliance School of Art and Design in St. Louis and at the JC Campbell Folk School. Jeff is the owner of The Walnut Log, Nova dealer, and distributor for Yorkshire Grit, Mylands, and Hampshire Sheen. Jeff is known for his colored Moroccan bowl and ornamental turning enhancements. A copy of

his video on the Moroccan bowl is available in our library. A video of this demonstration is available on the WTSTL YouTube channel and our library.

Thanks to Jeff for a great demonstration on how to create a basket weave illusion on turned items.







Pre-Meeting Demonstration Tom Zeller — Texturing ● Tom hosted a pre-meeting demo showing various techniques for texturing: Wagner knurling, Sorby mini texturing and spiraling, Elf.... Members got to see up close the designs created by each tool and how to make it "pop" using groves and burning.

I will act as an interim Coordinator, but I would like to have another club member take that responsibility. Contact me if you would be willing to serve in that role.

Many thanks to our returning members and new members for attending the club meeting. I am hoping the Presidents challenge inspires you to start turning an item. If not the president's challenge, turn something for show and tell. I know it is very hot in most garages during the summer. Maybe go out early one morning and give it a go on the lathe.

Turner's tip- I was having trouble with tool rest slipping in the banjo as I turned. I had to really crank down on the locking handle many times thinking I was going to break the handle. I called the tech representative for Laguna tool, and he suggested that I rough up the inside of the banjo receiver (opening). I wasn't warm to that idea. I shared my problem with some other woodturners and Barry Boeckstiegel came up with another solution. He suggests that I get a hammer and punch tool; and hammer a divot in a couple of places on the tool rest shaft. I did just that and my problem was solved. If you have a shop tip you think would help our membership, please bring them to our next club meeting.

Shop safety - Just a reminder to always wear safety glasses and a dust mask. If you are working in open air shop stay hydrated as things start to heat up for the summer. If you are turning for more than an hour, remember to stop, stretch and take a break.

Keith Braizer will be our demonstrator in August. He will demonstrate a natural edge bowl, he likes to turn green wood and see how the wood changes as it dries. He has been turning for 10 plus years and building furniture for 40 years. He likes ash and cherry wood, but his favorite wood is the wood he finds that he can make something with. Keith will share his turning experiences and his experience with suppliers and woodturning tips. Keith likes to connect the dots.

Thanks to all of you that help with the setup and tear down for each of the meetings. It is really appreciated. It takes a lot of effort to set up the chairs, tables, lathe, and audio/video for each meeting.

- Back has upper tool and lower wood storage
- Top and ends hold misc. measuring calipers
- Front holds up to 14 turning tools. Slope behind tool slots is clear for falling sawdust and can be lifted for full cleaning.
- It is sized with lifting wheels to go under the lathe, pick it up and move it about the shop, as needed. Bill Grimes


