The November meeting will be a wine and cheese social with an officer election and ornament exchange on November 20th 2022 (NEW DATE).



Linda Osterwise – Workings with resins ● Linda provided a great overview on resin products and how to cast them. She covered the many types of resins from quick setting to slow pour, which to use for a deep pour, how to add color to the resin, and the equipment needed.



Linda started the demo by casting a pen blank and putting it in a pressure pot so it would be ready for viewing at the end of the meeting. The pressure pot, a modified Harbor Freight paint

pressure system, is needed for many resins to reduce the size air bubbles in the pour. She then moved on to showing the various molds that she uses for casting – the HTPE that is a rigid mold, to a soft silicone mold, to a

hard silicone mold. Some of Linda's molds are made with a 3-D printing process to create various designs. One her most popular pens is the wave which requires quick pouring of multiple colors before going into the pressure pot. Typical resin working



time is 12 minutes. Linda casts pen blanks, bottle stopper blanks, and other shapes that include figures and various items.



Linda demonstrated the vacuum pot that is used for stabilizing wood. After covering the blank to be stabilized with Cactus Juice (commercial brand of stabilizing resin) she placed it in the vacuum pot to show how the vacuum sucks the air from the blank letting the liquid resin in as the pressure is lowered and then further stabilized as the pressure is brought back up. Heat is then used to set the resin in the wood.

President's Spin● The November meeting will be a wine and cheese social, officer election, and ornament exchange on November 20th 2022 (NEW DATE).

There are many woods that can be hazardous to wood turners. Look at the list below be sure to wear a mask and protective covering if necessary. Woods affect each of us differently. Turning Cocobolo may not affect you but, it may affect your woodturning buddy. The owner of Bridge City Tool Works made some very fine measuring tools many with cocobolo. He later became very sick and the doctors determined it was from cocobolo dust. Today he cannot be in a building where cocobolo wood was used. Marc Adams School of Woodworking in Franklin Indiana does not allow any exotic woods in their school.

Below is a partial list of woods that may impact you when you are turning and their effect on us.

African Blackwood - irritant and sensitizer

Black Locust - irritant and nasal

Bloodwood - irritant, excessive thirst, salivation, nausea

Bocote - cross reactions possible once sensitivity to other woods have developed

Boxwood European - irritant, sensitizer

Bubinga-???

Camphor - irritant, asthma, headaches, giddiness

Cedar Aromatic red - irritant

Cocobolo - irritant, sensitizer, nausea, asthma, pink eye

Ebony - irritant, sensitizer, pink eye

Ironwood, desert - irritant, sneezing, coughing

Katalox – irritant

Lacewood – irritant

Lignum Vitae – irritant

Mahogany, African – irritant, sensitizer

Maple - irritant, sensitizer, asthma; hypersensitivity pneumonitis in spalted maple

Mimosa – irritant

Myrtle - irritant, sensitizer

Olive - irritant, sensitizer

Osage Orange - irritant, sap can cause dermatitis

Padauk - irritant, sensitizer, nausea, asthma

Poplar - irritant, blisters, asthma, bronchitis

Purpleheart - irritant, sensitizer, nausea,

Redwood - irritant, sensitizer, asthma, HP, NPC (rare)

Rosewoods - irritant, sensitizer, asthma

Sassafras - sensitizer, nausea, respiratory, direct toxin, NPC (rare)

Walnut, Black - irritant, sensitizer, NPC (rare)

Western Hemlock - irritant, NPC (rare)

Tambootie - irritant, diarrhea, blindness, direct toxic

It's always enjoyable to have a fire outdoors or in a fireplace. But it's important to know that you can't burn all the woods. Some types of wood produce toxic gases when burned, which is dangerous to your health. It does not matter if you have a wood burning stove or a fireplace or even you want to burn on a bonfire outside the house, there are some wood you should not burn e.g. treated wood and scraps from YEW wood, Eastern Red Cedar (Juniperus virginiana), also known as aromatic Cedar. Caution- Eastern Red Cedar is quite toxic if ingested. Other toxic woods that should NOT BE BURNED include: Poison Oak, poison Ivy, poison Sumac, Oleander, Mexican pepper, Driftwood, Greenwood, Plywood, Chipboard, Wood Pallets, Stained woods and Treated woods

I distributed some extra wood at the October meeting some of which was yew wood. I know yew was used in Europe to make bows. PLEASE BE CAREFUL THIS WOOD IS TOXIC. A quote from the 1st Century states that yew is similar to other trees in general appearance ... "It is a certain fact that traveler's vessels, made in Gaul of yew for the purpose of holding wine, have caused the death of those who used them." Pliny the Elder 77AD.

If you are a new turner (or even an experienced turner) looking for help or needing a question answered, contact me and we will get you to someone that can help. Members will be directed to the Mentor Coordinator, and he/she will have the responsibility to direct the member to another member that can help. I will act as an interim Coordinator, but I would like to have another club member take that responsibility. Contact me if you would be willing to serve in that role.

Many thanks to Linda Osterwise for her presentation on resin /casting and how to use them to make pen blanks, bottle stopper and to harden wood that has become soft. It provided insight to how long it takes to make resin products and to stabilize wood.

Shop safety, just a reminder always wear safety glasses and a dust mask and stay hydrated. If you are turning for more than an hour, remember to stop, stretch and take a break.

Thanks to all of you that help with the setup and tear down for each of the meetings. It is really appreciated. It takes a lot of effort to set up the chairs, tables, lathe, and audio/video for each meeting. - **Tom Zeller**
