Jeff Hornung – Playing with Fire / Shou Sugi Ban● Shou Sugi Ban (or Yakisugi, as it is known in Japan) means "burned cedar." It is an 18th-century Japanese wood burning technique that creates an intriguing charred appearance that highlights natural wood veining, creates textural interest, and varies in appearance according to how much fire is applied and which type of wood is used.





Jeff prefers to use hard maple for his pieces but other woods such as red cedar, cypress, pine, basswood, and oak can be used. This technique can be applied to any turning. For the demonstration Jeff used a heart shape blank cut from maple.



The blank is mounted between centers, the back is

shaped and a tenon is cut. The piece is then mounted on a chuck and further shaped with the tail stock in place for safety (as long as possible). The piece is then ready for the fire.

Moving to a safe place for fire, in the open air, the surface is burned. You want the surface to caramelize the resins – not just turn black and sooty. When it crackles – move on. Propane will work but MAPP gas works bett



will work but MAPP gas works better.

After the surface is charred, a steel brush is used to remove the majority of the char. Then move on to brass and then nylon brushes to finish. A powered brush can be used to speed up the process. Brush with the grain to remove the char.

Jeff uses Unicorn Spit (brand name) to colorize the surface. The surface is wet with a spray bottle to help the colors blend. Colors are then





applied and blended going from the lightest to darkest. Black accent streaks are applied with a small brush.

Since Unicorn Spit is water based, Rustoleum 2x is used to seal the turning.

Thanks, Jeff, for a great demonstration on a unique method to burn and then colorize our turnings.

President's Spin Thanks to everyone for helping with the pre-meeting hands on turning. At the May meeting (note that it will be on the third Sunday due to the holiday) we want to expand the hands-on time. We are still formulating the format

but it will be along the lines of: rotation of two or three projects (top, bowl, platter) so that turners have an extended time to experience both spindle and cross grain turning with 4 lathes available for turning; start at 1130am and wrap up around 3pm. We also plan on having a demonstration in the main meeting room for those that enjoy that experience. The main demo will be available for review via video for those participating in the hands on turning.

We will have more defined by the April meeting and discuss it then. their experiences and treatment. Children receive a bead for every test, procedure, or treatment they undergo. Woodturners donate boxes to hold the beads they earn. Before the meeting, the hands on demo was the spindle gauge. All three Comet lathes were used by mentors and members to share helpful tips and tricks. Tom

brought a fourth lathe in to demonstrate several ways to finish off the back of a bowl.

Tom opened the meeting and provided information regarding upcoming activities and meeting plans. He mentioned that the meeting in May was going to be an "open shop" meeting – meaning that in addition to having a demonstration the hands-on turning would be open from 1130am – 300pm. Members that want some mentoring or help with a project can turn for an extended period of time.
