Ken Bald – Turning a pepper mill ● Ken used walnut for his pepper mill but any hardwood works well. Once turned round, cut tenons on both ends, mark the blank for future



grain alignment; and separate into a top and bottom.



A hole is drilled completely through the bottom blank using a Forstner bit. Ken drilled half way from one end, rotated the blank and completed drilling through from the



other end. Additional drilling was done to accept the bottom mechanism.



The top was mounted in the chuck, a recess cut to accept the top mechanism, and a hole drilled through the top for the mechanism rod. A tenon was then cut on the top to fit the hole in the bottom blank.





The top and bottom were then jam fit together to shape the mill.

WTSTL Tool Boxes and Turning Tools ● Each of our Comet lathes has a number and there is a tool box with tools with the same number in the movable/lockable cabinets. When setting up the pre-meeting area get the numbered box that goes with that Comet. This helps us identify any missing items and which box to replenish.

It is also very important to put the tools from a specific box back into that same box for inventory control. And, be sure that the tool boxes are taken back to the meeting room and stored in the locked mobile cabinets. The chuck and all loose items (spurs, knock out bar, ...) should be removed from the lathe and put back in the tool box for secure storage.

Mentoring● The Board recognizes the value of hands-on and one-on-one instruction. Check the website for information on the mentoring program. It will be one turner at a time; you must provide your project, tools, and face shield; a mask must also be worn. Make arrangements with the mentors to participate. Several of our members have taken advantage of this opportunity and provided very positive feedback on the mentors knowledge and instruction.

WTSTL Hybrid Meetings● Each meeting lets us improve and address new issues with our hybrid system. In person meetings will continue to be open to visitors (except when a paid demonstrator is scheduled); remote participation will be available via Zoom. We are discussing the possibility of exchanging Zoom demonstrations with other clubs around the world. More to follow as details are defined.

President's Spin The Presidents challenge for September is to turn, A. a peppermill or B. a mortar and pestle or C. a plate. I hope we have enough entries to have both a novice and experienced categories. If you have questions about making any of the items please contact me.

I recently took a refresher class on spindle turning with a professional turner in Kansas City. We reviewed the four basic shapes found in spindle turning. The bead, cove, vee and plane or straight cut. Leaning to control these cuts is key to improving your turning skills. The class was taught using a spindle gouge however a skew chisel will make the same cuts probably even better if you have mastered the skew. No matter how complex every spindle consists of a bead, cove, vee or straight used in different combinations. When working on a spindle blank always work/turn from the larger diameter to the smaller diameter. Generally, the larger diameter is near the head stock. Divide each shape in half and cut each section with a downhill motion. This will help eliminate torn grain and catches. Use a story stick with dividing lines for different shapes. Paul Krautmann demonstrated this technique to our club in our March 2022 meeting. Transfer the lines to the spindle blank. You can use a parting tool and calipers to turn diameters. The key to getting better at spindle turning is to practice making beads and coves and vee on a piece of scrap wood. The practice helps you develop tool control so that you can turn the same bead or cove consistently over and over again. Now that doesn't sound like fun but, it will help develop skills that will be carried over into other areas of wood turning. My goal is to offer a spindle turning demonstration at a pre-meeting in the future.

One of the keys to improved turning skills is sharp tools. Are you keeping your tools sharp enough? Or are you continuing to turn with dull tools. If you are turning and you're not sure about the shape of your tools please ask for help. The club has a grinder in the storage room and I generally bring a slow speed grinder to the pre-meeting. So if you're not sure about your cutting tools bring them to the pre-meeting.

Woodcraft is conducting a bandsaw tune-up demo September 9 at 1:00pm Maryland Heights Saint Louis. If you haven't checked your bandsaw recently this could be a good refresher course. In addition they have Nova chucks on sale this month. Rockler has Titebond glue and a three piece divider, caliper, compass set on sale this month.

Always wear safety glasses/face shield, a dust mask, and remember to stop, stretch, and take a break. Protecting your lungs is important; wear a mask. Shop safety should be important to all of us, please stay focused on safety.

The novice category is for those woodturners that are still developing their woodturning skills. Gift certificates will be awarded to both categories providing we have at least three entries for each category. I will leave it up to the honor system for choosing the category for placing your Presidents Challenge item. See you at the September meeting. - **Tom Zeller**

President's Challenge • Members select their choice of winner for the PC. During the break, review the items on the challenge table. Separate your ticket and write your selection (the number in front of each entry) on the back of the one marked "TICKET". Place it in the PC bowl. Your voting ticket will enter you in the door prize drawing. One PC entry per member; must be turned following the challenge. There are NOW TWO categories for the President's Challenge – Novice and Open. Individuals decide which category to place their entry depending on the challenge. An experienced turner may never have done the challenge and feels like a novice. The category selected is done on the honor system. When voting – vote for one entry in the open category and one entry in the novice category. (Note – if there are insufficient entries for either category they may be combined.)

Vice President's Report ● <u>Beads of Courage</u>: The Beads of Courage is a program for kids in need. BOC is a not-profit organization dedicated to improving the quality of life for children and teens coping with serious illness. The program integrates the use of beads as visible, tangible symbols of their

experiences and treatment. Children receive a bead for every test, procedure, or treatment they undergo. Woodturners donate boxes to hold the beads they earn. Details on requirements for the boxes can be found on the club web site. Suggestions for BOC bags can

be found here. Ceramic beads to attach to the boxes are \$1.25 (13/16" in diameter) and available from Ken. Bring your boxes (or bags) to the meeting and give them to Ken Bald. — **Ken Bald**

Turning Tips ●

Watch out cleaning the shaft of your carbide tools with your finger.
 The carbide cutting edge may slice your finger.



- Be cautious of sanding disks that extend past the surface they are mounted on. When rotating at high speed they will slice you.




