John Ferreira – Casting resin blanks ● John shared tips and techniques for making a composite turning blank. He likes to work with an epoxy combined with wood, glitter, pine cones, gum balls,... and



other items from nature. Moisture is the enemy of a resin so all materials must be extremely dry. John may keep items in a toaster oven at low

temperature (~100 degrees) for several days prior to the casting. A stabilizing resin may also be used on some items for added strength.

Due to the fluidity of the epoxy it is important that a good seal be established to keep it from leaking out of the form before curing. Hot glue



combined with plastic sheets make an excellent sealing media. John discussed the various types of epoxy that can be used for a thin, medium, and thick pour. A gallon of resin is over \$100, so to save casting material plugs – wood, plastic,... are often used.

WTSTL Tool Boxes and Turning Tools ● Each of our Comet lathes has a number and there is a tool box with tools with the same number in the movable/lockable cabinets. When setting up the pre-meeting area get the numbered box that goes with that Comet. This helps us identify any missing items and which box to replenish.

It is also very important to put the tools from a specific box back into that same box for inventory control. And, be sure that the tool boxes are taken back to the meeting room and stored in the locked mobile cabinets. The chuck and all loose items (spurs, knock out bar, ...) should be removed from the lathe and put back in the tool box for secure storage.

Mentoring ● The Board recognizes the value of hands-on and one-on-one instruction. Check the website for information on the mentoring program. It will be one turner at a time; you

must provide your project, tools, and face shield; a mask must also be worn. Make arrangements with the mentors to participate. Several of our members have taken advantage of this opportunity and provided very positive feedback on the mentors knowledge and instruction.

WTSTL Hybrid Meetings ● Each meeting lets us improve and address new issues with our hybrid system. In person meetings will continue to be open to visitors (except when a paid demonstrator is scheduled); remote participation will be available via Zoom. We are discussing the possibility of exchanging Zoom demonstrations with other clubs around the world. More to follow as details are defined.

**Website●** Electronic membership to the WTSTL is available via the club website. After entering your contact information and selecting your plan, <u>log on to your PayPal account</u> to complete your application and enter the amount to pay. When PayPal asks for our organization, enter **Woodturners of St. Louis.** You will receive a follow up email with your membership card. If you are not contacted within a couple of weeks, email the club Treasurer.

We need your help too. Please give us feedback on the good and bad with the A/V system so we can make your online participation a great experience.

<u>Please mute yourself during the meeting as any background noise overpowers the demonstrator and puts</u> you in the demo screen.

Please send Rob and Charlie an email with any suggestions. We monitor the chat but texts, email, and voice feedback is difficult during the meeting as the AV team is quite occupied with operation of the equipment.



**President's Spin●** The President's challenge for October is to an item with a Halloween theme – turner's choice on the item.

I recently saw a YouTube video by Burt Hovander titled <u>Woodturning Sorby Spiraling and Texturing Tools</u>. It is 1 hr 20 min in length. It is a step-by-step instruction on how to use the Sorby spiraling tool. It is very detailed, honest (Burt doesn't try to hide his mistakes) and easy to follow. I hope you review this video to gain a better understanding of spiraling and texturing. Please remember he is demonstrating on hard maple. Your results may differ if you use a different/softer type of wood.

I took a class recently to conduct an audit to see how other teachers teach their students. I contacted the organization a week before the class was scheduled to start. I wanted to know who was going to teach the class. Upon my inquiry the operator could not tell me who was going to teach the class. Not a really good start. A later inquiry to the organization provided me with an answer as to who was teaching. Upon arrival in the class the instructor did not provide a syllabus, or an outline or a detailed description of the class. The lathes were too tall for the average student. I was told that a riser was available, but I did not see it. In addition, there were no floor mats to keep you from slipping on the wood savings. The class did provide tools and they appeared to be sharp, however the sharpener was in a different room. The class was not over crowded or overly expensive. The instructor was friendly, helpful, and encouraging and the turning material was excellent. I was able to share some of my experience with the other students in the class. I believe the organization could do a better job with a plan/outline as to the direction of the class and provide a more experienced instructor.

The reason I audit classes is this. I took a class from an organization ten years ago. It was supposed to be a basic / beginning class to woodturning. When we arrived at the class the instructor had two or three tools at each workstation. The instructor also had a wood blank at each station. He introduced himself, told us how to mark the end of the blank stock and how to load it into the lathe. He demonstrated one planeing cut with the spindle roughing gouge and said this was what you should practice and left the room. Two other students turned to me and said they were heading home to practice. They didn't see a need to stay. I didn't say anything at the time because I thought the instructor knew more than I did. This wasn't a class; it was a complete waste of time and money from an organization that didn't care about its customers!

- 1. If the organization doesn't know who is going to teach or what is being taught, the class may not be organized, and the instructor may have limited experience.
- 2. The instructor does not have a syllabus or an outline or a detailed list of tasks he or she wants to accomplish. If you have no objectives, how do you know if the class was successful.
- 3. Ask other woodturner/wood workers about the organization you are thinking about. Did they have a successful time at a class you may be interested in.
- 4. If the class starts off in the wrong direction, stop immediately and ask the instructor about the class. If you are still not satisfied go see the owner/ director of the organization and alert them to the issue.


