Jerry Rymarquis, WTSTL member, discussed how he turns what is called a melted box and faux fractal (high voltage) burning embellishment.

The melted box starts as a segmented glue up or solid piece of wood. A glue block is attached to one end. Four holes are drilled through the block from one end to the other for placement of dowels that will later register the pieces. The holes are located toward the inside and will be turned away when the box is hollowed.



Once the blank is turned into a cylinder, a jig is used to hold it while cutting artistic slices with a band saw. The slices are then rounded on the ends about ¾ inch back using burrs and smoothed with a sander. Then, using the registering dowels, the pieces are reassembled and glued together using a press. Once





the glue is dry the interior can be drilled and opened up by turning taking care to not cut into the recesses. Depending on the number of slices and height of the blank the interior may be hollowed as they are glued together.

The faux fractal burning is done by first sketching on a pattern. Then the lines are cut using small bits with a rotary cutter (Foredom or Dremel). A wood burner with a ball, skew, and spear tips are used to burn in the lines.

Pre – Meeting Demo ● Thanks to Jeff Nasser for his tips on finishes for turnings. Jeff covered polyurethanes, water based varnish (not as durable as oil based), lacquer (spray & brush; quick drying), shellac (spray and alcohol mix), CA

(superglue-hard and will give a glass like finish), tung and Danish oil (drying times can be an issue). If dust is an issue, Jeff suggested wetting the shop floor (but use caution when walking on a wet floor). Jeff also discussed sanding techniques and buffing with a cotton cloth, paper towel, and brown paper bags. He recommends a book by Bob Flexner and Jewitt on finishing.



WTSTL Tool Boxes and Turning Tools ● Each of our Comet lathes has a number and there is a tool box with tools with the same number in the movable/lockable cabinets. When setting up the pre-meeting area get the numbered box that goes with that Comet. This helps us identify any missing items and which box to replenish.

It is also very important to put the tools from a specific box back into that same box for inventory control. And, be sure that the tool boxes are taken back to the meeting room and stored in the locked mobile cabinets. The chuck and all loose items (spurs, knock out bar, ...) should be removed from the lathe and put back in the tool box for secure storage.

Mentoring● The Board recognizes the value of hands-on and one-on-one instruction. Check the website for information on the mentoring program. It will be one turner at a time; you must provide your project, tools, and face shield; a mask must also be worn. Make arrangements with the mentors to participate. Several of our members have taken advantage of this opportunity and provided very positive feedback on the mentors knowledge and instruction.

WTSTL Hybrid Meetings ■ Each meeting lets us improve and address new issues with our hybrid system. In person meetings will continue to be open to visitors (except when a paid demonstrator is scheduled); remote participation will be available via Zoom. We are discussing the possibility of exchanging Zoom demonstrations with other clubs around the world. More to follow as details are defined.

Website● Electronic membership to the WTSTL is available via the club website. After entering your contact information and selecting your plan, log on to your PayPal account to complete your application and enter the amount to pay. When PayPal asks for our organization, enter Woodturners of St. Louis. You will receive a follow up email with your membership card. If you are not contacted within a couple of weeks, email the club Treasurer.


We need your help too. Please give us feedback on the good and bad with the A/V system so we can make your online participation a great experience.


