Jeff Nasser was our July demonstrator on turning baby rattles. He starts with a blank $\sim 6" \times 19/16 \times 19/16"$. A hole is drilled in both ends to hold the popcorn (rattle). The hole is $\sim 1"$ in diameter.



A mark is made on the outside of the blank to indicate the depth of the hole. Then another mark $^{\sim}5/16$ " further down to indicate where the shaping can start.

End caps are turned to plug the hole and glued into the blank sealing in the popcorn (or whatever you want to use).



The blank is rounded and shaped into a barbell. The center shaft



is $\sim \frac{1}{4}$ " at the ends and $\frac{5}{16}$ " in the middle. Make it larger if you are concerned with breakage.

Sandpaper is wetted with Danish oil for sanding.

And after going through the grits a CA finish is applied.

Editor's Note: The government has a document on requirements for baby rattles: 16 CFR Part 1510. There is a jig to check rattles for size and even a bite test. The referenced regulation has a minimum diameter that is slightly larger than what Jeff used. There may be later regulations so do your own due diligence. The article on "baby choke tester" was published by Nick Cook in the Fall 2004 American Woodturner by the AAW.

Baby Choke Tester

Also known as a Small Object Tester, a choke tester should be a part of every home to verify if toys and other objects are safe for infants. I have discovered that choke testers are challenging to locate. After visiting several baby and toy stores, I finally found one at www.homesafetysolutions.com and ordered several for \$2.25.

I also located helpful information at the U. S. Consumer Product Safety Commission at www.cpsc.gov. There I found a two-page document titled Small Parts Regulation, Toys and Products Intended for Use by Children Under 3 Years Old. It contains the specifications for a small-parts test fixture. Details about additional rattle requirement (16 CFR Part 1510), also are available at the same website. This states that a rattle diameter must be 1¹¹/16" or larger as shown at right.

Too small! This rattle fails the U.S. Consumer Product guidelines for a $1^{11}16^\circ$ diameter or larger parts. The hole shown was drilled with a $1^\circ4^\circ4$ Forstner bit.

WTSTL Tool Boxes and Turning Tools ● Each of our Comet lathes has a number and there is a tool box with tools with the same number in the movable/lockable cabinets. When setting up the pre-meeting area get the numbered box that goes with that Comet. This helps us identify any missing items and which box to replenish.

It is also very important to put the tools from a specific box back into that same box for inventory control. And, be sure that the tool boxes are taken back to the meeting room and stored in the locked mobile cabinets. The chuck and all loose items (spurs, knock out bar, ...) should be removed from the lathe and put back in the tool box for secure storage.

Mentoring● The Board recognizes the value of hands-on and one-on-one instruction. Check the website for information on the mentoring program. It will be one turner at a time; you must provide your project, tools, and face shield; a mask must also be worn. Make arrangements with the mentors to participate. Several of our members have taken advantage of this opportunity and provided very positive feedback on the mentors knowledge and instruction.

WTSTL Hybrid Meetings ■ Each meeting lets us improve and address new issues with our hybrid system. In person meetings will continue to be open to visitors (except when a paid demonstrator is scheduled); remote participation will be available via Zoom. We are discussing the possibility of exchanging Zoom demonstrations with other clubs around the world. More to follow as details are defined.

Beads of Courage – boxes for storage of the patient's beads (see article in the NL) – give your items to Becky Blankenship.


