Meetings are now on THE 4<sup>th</sup> TUESDAY OF THE MONTH IN THE EVENING. Premeeting starts at 5pm and main meeting starts at 6:30PM. Meetings continue to be hosted at CTF at 8300 Valcour Ave; Affton, MO. Next meeting will be August 26, 2025.



**Jeff Hornung – Thread Chasing** Jeff demonstrated how to hand chase threads. Straight grain, dense, even stabilized wood works well. Acrylics are also are a good material to use.

Lathe speed is important for hand and eye coordination – 250- 300 is typical. Finer threads per inch are easier to chase but fewer materials will accept the higher tpi.



Start with a cylinder; cut a tenon on each end; mount it in a chuck and part off a section that will become the nut (female thread). Do the female threading first as it is easier to downsize the male than vice versa.





Use a Forstner bit to cut a straight hole and make a chamfer on the entry hole. Position the tool rest so the cutter is at centerline. With the chasing tool at about 45 deg start the thread. Once you get a full thread continue "chasing the tool." Across, out, and around motion. Use a pencil on the inside threads to check the



straightness of the work. Leave the tenon on at this time so adjustments can be made later if necessary. (Note a relief cut is not needed on the nut since the chasing tool goes all the way through. If this were a lid to a box then a relief gap would be needed between the threads and the lid inner surface so the tool can be removed without damaging the threads.)

Measure the inside of the female and add 1/16 to 1/8" for the male diameter. Take the blank down to that diameter and cut a chamfer on the end until it just starts to enter the female nut.



Cut a parting/stop gap at the top of the shaft for disengaging the tool. Start at an angle and bring the tool around and chase. Lift the handle as the thread progresses. Check with the nut and continue cutting until the fit is achieved.

Wax can be used to lube the cutting; superglue to stabilize wood threads.

Part the tenon off the nut. WORD can be used to create a hexagon shape that can be drawn on the cylinder and material ground away to shape the "nut". Cuts can be made on the screw shape as desired.

**Pre Meeting●** Steve Reynolds instructed several members on spindle turning – tools/mechanics/beads/coves....A summary of the instructions is under the demonstrator tab on the WTSTL website.

Mentoring ● The Board recognizes the value of hands-on and one-on-one instruction. Check the website for information on the mentoring program. It will be one turner at a time; you must provide your project, tools, and face shield; a mask must also be worn. Make arrangements with the mentors to participate. Several of our members have taken advantage of this opportunity and provided very positive feedback on the mentor's knowledge and instruction.

WTSTL Tool Boxes and Turning Tools ● Each of our Comet lathes has a number and there is a tool box with tools with the same number in the movable/lockable cabinets. When setting up the pre-meeting area get the numbered box that goes with that Comet. This helps us identify any missing items and which box to replenish.

It is also very important to put the tools from a specific box back into that same box for inventory control. And, be sure that the tool boxes are taken back to the meeting room and stored in the locked mobile cabinets. The chuck and all loose items (spurs, knock out bar, ...) should be removed from the lathe and put back in the tool box for secure storage.

**WTSTL Hybrid Meetings** ■ Each meeting lets us improve and address new issues with our hybrid system. In person meetings will continue to be open to visitors (except when a paid demonstrator is scheduled); remote participation will be available via Zoom.

**Website●** Electronic membership to the WTSTL is available via the club website. After entering your contact information and selecting your plan, log on to your PayPal account to complete your application and enter the amount to pay. When PayPal asks for our organization, enter **Woodturners of St. Louis.** You will receive a follow up email with your membership card. If you are not contacted within a couple of weeks, email the club Treasurer.

**President's Challenge for August 2025** – Turn an item with threading or community service item.

VP Safety Tips • Use a full face shield when turning on the lathe.

 Do not wear gloves, and avoid loose clothing or objects that may catch on rotating parts or accessories and tie back long hair. I know some of you wear gloves when operating the lathe BE CAREFUL.

- Always check the speed of the lathe before turning it on. Use slower speeds for larger diameter or rough pieces, and higher speeds for smaller diameter and pieces that are balanced. Always start a piece at a slower speed until the work piece is balanced. If the lathe is shaking or vibrating, you are going to fast, slow the speed down. If the workpiece vibrates, stop the machine to check out what is causing the vibration.
- Check that all locking devices on the tailstock and tool rest assembly (rest and base) are tight before operating the lathe.
- Position the tool rest close to work, almost touching the wood. Check tool rest position often and as wood is removed, turn off the lathe and re-position the rest.
- Rotate your work piece by hand to make sure it clears the tool rest and bed before turning the lathe "on, and is firmly mounted.
- Be aware of what the turners call the "red zone" or "firing zone." This is the area directly behind and in front of the workpiece the areas most likely for a piece to travel as it comes off the lathe. A good safety habit is to step out of this zone when switching the

lathe to the "on" position. When observing or watching others turn wood or materials stay out of the danger zone.

- Always contact the tool rest with the tool before contacting the wood.
- Turn the lathe power "off" before adjusting the tool rest or tool rest base (banjo).
- Remove the tool rest before sanding or polishing operations.
- Turn the power off when done and never leave the lathe running unattended.
- If somebody is turning on a lathe or misusing the lathe in an unsafe manner say something/speak up, safety is everybody's business.
